Planting Trees and Shrubs

1. Prepare a hole 12 inches wider and no deeper than the root ball. If you want to take extra special steps, make the hole wider, not deeper. Mix compost or peatmoss as directed, but not more than 20% by volume. If the soil is completely awful, a major excavation several feet across is advisable. This is usually not necessary. Mix in a high phosphorous “starter type fertilizer” as directed on the package a little on the bottom and the rest in the backfill.

If you are planting a bed of shallow rooted plants like rhododendron and azalea, and the soil lacks organic material, spread an inch or two of compost or peatmoss with some starter fertilizer and rototill it in as deeply as possible. Install your plants and mulch. They will love it!

2. Set the plant no deeper in the hole than it was growing in the nursery. The trunk “flare” should be above ground. This is the part of the trunk that widens out before the roots start. Trees planted too deep are at risk due to suffocation of the roots. Remove the burlap if it is possible, without allowing the root ball to fall apart. For large trees, this is generally not advisable. The metal basket should be left on, if necessary to keep the root ball intact. Often the top row or 2 of wires can be removed after setting the ball in the hole and partially backfilling to stabilize the tree.

3. Backfill hole about 3/4 with soil and firm around root ball. Flood the hole with water and finish backfilling when it has drained out. Leave a slight dish around the plant to aid watering. Water thoroughly about every week or 10 days as required. A slow deep soak infrequently is recommended.

4. Container grown plants may be root-bound. Scoring or roughing up the root ball will encourage faster establishment in its new home. A garden cultivator (scratcher) is very handy for this.

5. Mulching is very beneficial for trees and shrubs. It holds moisture, and encourages a healthier root system. Mulching too deeply can be detrimental. Three inches of bark mulch is recommended but taper the depth of the mulch to near zero at the trunk.

6. Staking trees is only necessary when the trees are particularly large or in a high wind area. Large evergreens with their large surface area are more prone to blowing over than shade or ornamental trees. When you stake, leave the supporting lines a little loose, as the tree’s roots will be stimulated to grow more aggressively when there is a little movement.

Be sure you remove the supports after a full season in place.

You will find us on Bristol Ferry Road (Route 114) about a mile south of the Mount Hope Bridge in Portsmouth Rhode Island. We have a large sign and there is a big greenhouse out front so we are hard to miss.

From Bristol, follow 114 S over the Mount Hope Bridge, bear (1/2) right, staying on Rt. 114 S about 1 mile. You will find us on the right just before the next light.

From Providence, follow Route 195 East to Route 24 South to the Turnpike Avenue exit. Turn left at the stop sign and we are the 4th house on the left after the light.

From West Bay, follow route 138 East over the Newport Bridge and then follow route 114 North. Go left at the light at Bristol Ferry Road (Route 114) and we are the 4th house on the left.

The Cary Awards

The Cary Award program was established to honor Edward A. Cary. Mr. Cary became known for an unusual collection of plants, many of which others assumed were not hardy to New England. When Edward passed away in 1987 he left his estate to the Worcester County Horticultural Society which is now the Hilltop Gardens in Worcester, Massachusetts. An endowment fund, for horticultural gifts and awards, was created in Mr. Cary's name.

A decade after his death, the Society created a prestigious horticultural honor - The Cary Award for Distinctive Plants for New England. Aimed at drawing attention to the types of unusual and under used plants that Edward Cary held so dear to his heart, The Cary Award has become synonymous with New England Hardiness.

You will find that we carry most of the Cary Award Winners and you will be able to identify them with their distinctive label. If you want to know more, just ask as we all like to talk about plants.

Our Guarantee

We guarantee all our trees and shrubs with the exception of roses for one year. We guarantee that our trees, shrubs, and evergreens are true to name, and that they will survive their first winter and will grow the following spring.

We expect that you will plant your plants in the ground and give them care as outlined in the planting instructions. The guarantee is for 100% of the purchase price redeemable in replacement plants. No cash refunds will be issued. Proof of purchase is required.

Note: Because roses are not reliably winter hardy in this area we cannot offer any guarantee other than they will thrive the season purchased.

Plants grown in above ground containers or out of our hardiness zone (6) - 10 degrees are expressly **not** guaranteed. Many are quite reliable and we will be happy to recommend trees and shrubs for containers or colder climates.

Delivery

We will be happy to arrange delivery of our trees and shrubs. Larger trees that can not be readily transported in a car are priced delivered in the local area. Additional charges may apply for deliveries out of the area or for smaller plants that can ordinarily be transported in your car. We customarily show a (D) on the price tag of plants that have delivery included in the price. Discounts may apply if you transport these larger plants yourself.

A word on Latin Names

We hope you are not intimidated by the use of latin names in this catalogue. This naming convention is a precise way to identify plant species and cultivars that is recognized world wide. A cross reference is provided in the beginning to aid in finding what you are looking for.

Our 2005 Collection

Abies concolor 3 gallon, 15-18 in. \$29.95

White Fir This western native has long pliable needles that are soft to the touch. They tend to be bluish green. The tree makes a handsome specimen that matures to over 50 feet tall.

Abies concolor Blue Cloak 18-24 in. \$129.95

White Fir This is a spreading form of white fir that will make a mound of lush bluish needles. It makes a great specimen.

Abies lasiocarpa arizonica Glauca Nana 24-30 in. \$129.95

Subalpine fir This small specimen is slow growing with bluish needles. It will grow into a small pyramidal tree eventually reaching 6-8 feet tall.

Abies koreana 4 ft. \$129.95

Korean Fir Lush dark green, soft needles on a moderate growing fir that matures to 30 feet. Large purple cones appear at a young age. This variety stands heat well.

Abies koreana Horstman's Silberloche 24 in. \$119.95

Korean Fir Blue grey needles curl around the stem for an unusual appearance. This is quite a beautiful variety.

Acer griseum 6-7 ft. (D) \$179.95

Paperbark maple Upright oval habit with trilobed leaves. Attractive exfoliating bark appears as tree matures to 25 x 25 feet. Leaves turn bright red in the fall.

Acer Japonicum

Green Cascade 36" Low graft \$249.95

Green Cascade 30" Low graft \$174.95

This attractive green leafed maple is broadly weeping with less feathery leaves than the dissectum types. Fall color is yellow, orange and crimson.

Acer linearilobum Red Pygmy 24" \$149.95

The thin strap-like lobes of the leaves give this group its name. This small variety will make a shrubby tree to about 6 feet tall and wide in about 20 years with red spring growth becoming somewhat greenish in late summer.

Acer linearilobum Villa Taranto 24" \$149.95

Similar in appearance to Red Pygmy the spring color is orange red with fall color being yellow to gold.

Acer palmatum

Japanese Maple Upright growing with palmate leaves that can be green, reddish, speckled, or multicolored. Generally Japanese Maples grow to 25 feet or more but can be dwarf as well. Fall color can be yellow, crimson, orange, or multicolored. Used extensively in Japanese garden settings, they are popular as specimen trees in many landscapes.

A slow growing tree with less deeply divided leaves than Bloodgood. It has pink new growth and holds its color well in the summer.

Dwarf form with light speckles on the leaves in an irregular pattern. Pink, cream, and red show on the new growth in the spring.		
Katsura 4 ft.	(D)	\$179.95
Pink, orange, and reddish spring growth matures into rich green smallish leaves in the summer. Fall color is bright yellow and orange..		
Okushimo 5 ft.	(D)	\$179.95
Vase shaped form with deeply divided leaves that curl at the tip for an unusual appearance. Fall color is bright gold.		
Omure Yama 4 ft.	(D)	\$274.95
An upright form with cascading branches make this maple distinctive. It has green leaves and makes a small tree. It's like a small weeping willow in the landscape.		
Oridono Nishiki 3 ft.	(D)	\$169.95
This tree has variegated leaves in pink red and cream. It is slow growing but eventually reaching 30 feet. One of the best variegates.

Sharp's Pygmy 30 in.	(D)	\$279.95
Very dwarf variety with deep green leaves turning orange to scarlet in the fall. It grows wider than tall and will not get more 3-4 feet tall.		
Shishigashira 4 ft.	(D)	\$199.95
<i>Lion's Mane Maple</i> This Japanese Maple has stubby growth and bright green curly leaves with a hint of red. Slow growing to about 10 feet, it is used effectively in small garden settings, containers and for bonsai.

White speckles produce pink and white tones irregularly over the leaves of this small tree.		
matsumurae Wo Nishiki 3 ft.	(D)	\$159.95
Deeply divided leaves starting yellow-green with rose to rusty red edges becoming bright light green. Tree will reach 15 feet in time.

<i>Cutleaf Japanese Maple</i> These are small cascading trees that have very finely dissected leaves. Most are red or a combination of red and green, while some are green all season. Fall color can be from red, orange or yellow. Most varieties grow 8-12 inches in width, per year while increasing in height slowly. I have seen very old plants as wide as 19' and 11' high.		
Everred 18 in.		\$99.95
Everred has very finely cut leaves that are purple-red with silver overtones in the spring changing to bronze-purple in the summer. It has purple branches in the winter spreading to over 10 feet wide.		
Garnet 5 gallon		\$99.95
Mounding habit with deep red-orange garnet colored foliage. It holds its color well into the summer. It is a strong grower to 12 x 12 feet.		
Red Filigree Lace 18 in.		\$139.95
Very finely dissected red leaves on a small growing, delicate looking plant. Useful in small places. It's very dwarf.		
Tamuke Yama 30 in.	(D)	\$169.95
Dark crimson to purple leaves and a strong cascading habit are the distinctive features of this cultivar. It holds its color well in the summer and has bright crimson fall color.

Veridis 15-18 in. 7 gallon		\$99.95
This is the most commonly grown green dissectum maple. Vigorous growth of finely dissected leaves presents a nice contrast in the landscape. It can be expected to get 12-15 feet wide and 8 feet tall.

This lacy leafed green dissectum has slightly larger leaves than the rest of the green dissectum maples. It is a good grower and has yellow and red fall color. A strong and trouble-free variety.

<i>Swamp Maple</i> This native New Englander grows to 30-40 tall and wide. Fall color is bright red. As the common name suggests, it will tolerate wet conditions. Red blooms are apparent in April.

<i>Full Moon Maple</i> Rounded leaves, with upright form emerge yellow-green in the spring changing to greenish if the weather gets hot. Fall color is often spectacular with yellow, gold, red, orange and occasionally purple. It is slow growing to about 15 feet and makes a distinctive appearance in the landscape.

Spring foliage starts bright yellow-green becoming darker as the summer progresses. Leaves are quite round. Fall color is orange blended with scarlet. This is a fairly slow grower to about 15 feet.

<i>Red Horse Chestnut</i> Showy, bright hot pink blooms in May and grows to 40 ft. This horse chestnut is less prone to leaf scorch than the white.

<i>Mimosa</i> Fernlike foliage emerges late spring to create a soft shade. Flowers resemble pink powder-puffs, giving a tropical flair. Prune and train for structural strength. Plants are prone to wind and ice damage. Mimosa is a fast grower to 30 feet tall and wide. Blooms in July.

A new introduction featuring dark red, almost brown leaves.

They are fast growing. Evidence suggests they are immune to bronze birch beetle. Use caution when choosing a location as they have aggressive roots that can damage drainage and septic pipes.

<i>Heritage River Birch</i> Attractive peeling bark, light salmon when young, it darkens to cinnamon with age.

<i>Butterfly Bush</i> Buddleia is a great plant for the summer garden. Vigorous growth produces a 6 foot shrub in 2 years. Plants will grow 6-8 feet tall in one summer. Slender spikes of florets attract many butterflies and humming birds. Remove spent blooms to extend blooming. Starts June. Cut Butterfly Bushes back to about 1 ft. tall in the spring.

Grapes are fairly easy to grow with the only real trick is learning how to prune and train them. They will usually produce good crops in a year or two. They do need a wire support or arbor to keep the vines off the ground. There are few pests with the only concern being mildew in the late summer. This can be controlled with fungicides containing copper.

Success With Roses

Roses are plants that respond to good care. The care required for some roses can be more of a challenge than for other kinds of flowering shrubs but the rewards are larger as well. Modern roses are very vigorous plants that grow and bloom constantly all summer. Provide an environment that is agreeable and most varieties will bloom constantly until frost

Rose Care

1. **Lime** the soil to achieve a pH of 6.5. A pH near neutral allows more of the nutrients in the soil to be available to the plant's roots. A soil test will tell you how much lime and fertilizer to apply.

2. Incorporate copious amounts of **compost or peat moss**. Organic materials are efficient in holding nutrients and delivering them to the plant roots. Peat moss works well but is fairly acidic, so adjust with lime. Well made compost is generally superior as it has nutrients and trace elements that peat moss lacks.
3. **Plant** roses in a very sunny place with good air circulation and water drainage. Roses need ample moisture but are not happy with waterlogged roots. Good air movement discourages fungus diseases. Wide spacing between plants is also helpful.
4. **Fertilize** with a rose food preparation according to the directions. Roses need more nutrients than most shrubs. You will notice that rose foods are a little more concentrated than other garden foods.
5. Spray to **prevent fungus**, rotating various fungicides, before you see any fungus. Common problems are powdery mildew and black spot. Clean up leaves and branches of last year's plants. Prevention is the rule with disease.
6. **Spray insects** as they appear. Prevention does not work for controlling insects. Use predatory insect controls such as lady bugs if you would like to avoid sprays.
7. **Remove spent flowers** immediately so the plant will start to grow new flowers. Allow seeds to form in the fall to encourage plants to go dormant.
8. **Prune** to 1-1.5 feet tall in the spring keeping only young, healthy canes. Climbers need to have one and two year old growth remain because they bloom on established canes.
10. Roses need a constant source of **water** during the heat of the summer. Avoid using a sprinkler, because wet foliage invites disease. A long, slow soaking no more than once a week is an effective way to provide water so as not to get the leaves wet. Mulching conserves moisture. Pine bark mulch or wood chips tend to acidify and consume nitrogen as they decompose. This is not necessarily bad as long as you compensate with appropriate lime and fertilizer. Cocoa mulch or buckwheat suppress weeds and adds fertility.
11. **Winter protection** is important for many roses as they are more tender than other shrubs. Roses are reluctant to go dormant in the fall. The canes are fairly succulent and are prone to the "freeze drying" effects of winter winds. Mound up soil or compost around the crown of the plant or make an enclosure of burlap or tar paper to contain this material. This protection keeps the canes moist and mitigates the effects of freeze thaw cycles during the winter. Remove mulch in the spring by the first of April when you do your final pruning.

Rose Types

Hybrid tea roses are those traditional types that produce single, large, flowers on long stems. They make impressive cut flowers but do not usually produce many at a time. Hybrid teas will generally bloom all summer and be a constant source of flowers for the table. Because they don't produce a lot of flowers at a time, it is wise to grow them in a back garden and not as part of the general landscape.

Floribunda roses are shrubby plants that produce a lot of small flowers on a fairly compact plant. It is a good landscape plant in that it makes a great show repeatedly during the season. The flower sprays can be cut as well, although the stems are not particularly long. Floribundas usually grow to about 3 feet.

Grandiflora roses are plants that are particularly vigorous. Plants can reach a

height of over six feet. Grandiflora types produce large flowers in sprays. They are excellent both as a producer of cut flowers as well as a showy element in the garden. **Climbing roses** produce very long branches or 'canes' that produce many blooms after the second year. Canes may grow 10 feet long.

Low Landscape Roses are similar to floribundas but are more free flowering and usually produce smaller and simpler blooms. They are effective landscape plants.

Old fashioned roses are roses of historical significance. Many have strong fragrance and are the genetic source of many modern varieties.

David Austin roses Developed to give improved performance in the garden while having the appearance of old fashioned types, but reoccurring bloom.

Flower Carpet These have been bred for free flowering with little pruning or dead heading. Flowers are semi-double and the foliage is quite disease resistant.
